

June 14, 2023

- 501(c)(3) organizations
 - Organized and operated **exclusively** for charitable 0 purposes
 - Contributions are deductible 0
 - **Electoral work prohibited** 0
- 501(c)(4)
 - Organized primarily for charitable purposes (60%/40%) 0
 - Unlimited lobbying 0
 - Contributions not deductible
 - Some electoral work is permitted 0



Possible Nonprofit Structures

- **Unincorporated Association**
- Unincorporated entity with a Fiscal Sponsor
- Incorporated (State Law)
- Tax Exemption (Federal Law)
 - §501(c)(3) 0
 - §501(c)(4)
- Election related entities (§527



The electoral line is not always clear:


- Perceived endorsement or opposition Why scorecards and candidate questionnaires are 0 tough for many 501(c)(3) orgs
- Not just what you are saying, but when you are saying it • and how much you're spending to say it
- What is deemed political? Who decides?



Ancillary entities affiliated with nonprofits are potentially subject to regulation and reporting requirements from multiple entities, including:

- Internal Revenue Service
- Charities Bureau of the State Attorney General
- State Lobbying Commission
- Local Lobbying regulator
- State Board of Elections
- **Campaign Finance Board**

Independent Expenditure Group

FIREWALL

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Incorporating in the State of NY

Form a Non-Profit Corporation:

- 1. Choose the initial directors and officers for your nonprofit
- 2. Choose a name for your New York nonprofit corporation <u>Note:</u> Obtain permission to use your school's name Verify Name uniqueness: <u>New York Business Name Database</u>
- 3. Develop your mission statement This will become your statement of purpose that meets IRS requirements
- 4. Prepare bylaws for your New York nonprofit corporation

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Incorporating in the State of NY

Form a Non-Profit Corporation (contd):

5. Prepare and file your nonprofit articles of organization

The Department of State has a fillin-able <u>Certificate of Incorporation 1511-f.pdf (ny.gov)</u> form on its website which you can use to create your nonprofit corporation. <u>1511-inst.pdf (ny.gov)</u> <u>Note:</u> The articles form on the Department of State's website has the minimal information necessary to create a nonprofit in New York. It does not include language required by the IRS to obtain 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status. To receive tax-exempt status from the IRS, you'll need certain additional specific language in your certificate of incorporation, including: statements that your non-profit will not engage in prohibited political or legislative activity, and a dissolution of assets provision dedicating your assets to another 501(c)(3) organization upon

dissolution.

<u>Note:</u> Approval may need to be obtained from the NYS Department of Education. <u>consent form (nysed.gov)</u>

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Incorporating in the State of NY

Form a Non-Profit Corporation (contd):

6. Hold a meeting of your board of directors

Your first board meeting is usually referred to as the organizational meeting of the board. The board should take such actions as:

- Approving the bylaws
- Appointing officers
- Setting an accounting period and tax year, and
- Approving initial transactions of the corporation, such as the opening of a corporate bank account.
- After the meeting is completed, be sure to create minutes of the meeting.
- Consider setting up a budget.

Form a Non-Profit Corporation (contd):

7. Set up a corporate records binder

You should set up a corporate records binder for your nonprofit to hold important documents such as articles of incorporation, bylaws, and minutes of meetings.

Incorporating in the State of NY

File for 501(c)3 status with the IRS

- 1. Apply for a federal Employer Identification Number (EIN) This requires form SS-4 (Form SS-4) (Form SS-^{\$} Instructions)
- Complete and submit Form 1023 or 1023EZ which is an application. 2. See Publication 557 for detailed instructions. Will require:
 - Certification of Incorporation
 - Bylaws
 - Financial Data (depending on how long you have existed)
 - Fee

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Incorporating in the State of NY

File for NY State Tax Exemption

Sales tax exemption certificates enable a purchaser to make tax-free purchases that would normally be subject to sales tax. The purchaser fills out the certificate and gives it to the seller. The seller keeps the certificate and may then sell property or services to the purchaser without charging sales tax.

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Incorporating in the State of NY

File for NY State Tax Exemption

- Submit Form ST-119.2 Application for Exempt Organization Certificate.
 - Attach your IRS determination letter if you have one,
 - a statement of activities,
 - a statement of expenses, and
 - a statement of assets and liabilities.
- Submit Form CT-247 Application for Exemption from Corporate Franchise Taxes by a • **NonProfit Organization**
 - Attach your IRS determination letter

Incorporating in the State of NY

Register with NY State Charities Bureau

"Most organizations that hold property of any kind for charitable purposes or engage in charitable activities in New York State and/or solicit charitable contributions (including grants from foundations and government grants) in New York are required to register with the Attorney General's Charities Bureau. Under New York Law, charity is defined very broadly to include purposes such as education, relief of poverty, cultural programs, promotion of health and research to cure disease, and many other purposes that are beneficial to the community. "

Incorporating in the State of NY

Register with NY State Charities Bureau

Registration requires:

- Form CHAR410 (Registration Statement)
- Copy of Certificate of Incorporation
- Copy of Bylaws
- Copy of application for Federal Tax Exemption (Form 1023) or IRS Determination letter
- Fee

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Managing A Nonprofit Organization

No single New York State law of charities oversight exists. Rather there is a complex mix of different areas so organizations must be aware of the rules from various entities.

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Managing A Nonprofit Organization

Non-Profit Board Responsibilities:
Three Primary Legal Duties:

1. Duty of Care 2. Duty of Loyalty

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3. Duty of Obedience

Duty of Care:

- Active participation in the governance and oversight of the activities of your organization.
- Ensuring prudent use of the organization's assets including its members and good will.

ance and organization. nization's assets will.

Duty of Loyalty:

- Ensuring the activities nonprofit's transactions are advancing its mission.
- Disclose conflicts of interest.
- Make decisions that are in the best interest of the organization, not the individual board member or any other entity.

Duty of Obedience:

- Ensure that the nonprofit obeys all applicable laws and regulations.
- Ensure that bylaws are followed.
- Ensure that the nonprofit adheres to its stated mission.

A board does not exist only to fulfill the legal duties and fiduciary responsibilities of the organization. Board members also provide guidance by contributing to the:

- Culture
- Strategic Focus
- Effectiveness
- Financial sustainability
